

Today's Gospel begins with the disciples complaining that there are people using Jesus' name to cast out demons and that those people are not among His followers. This is reflecting the situation related in the first reading from the book of Numbers about how Eldad and Medad received the gift of prophecy even though they had not been present with the group of seventy. What one may conclude is that the gift of God's Spirit is not limited but can be experienced in wonderful ways.

But then, the Gospel turns to the issue of causing sin and scandal. Jesus uses very graphic language to describe these situations. "If your hand causes you to sin, cut it off..." For all of us we have experiences of sin. Sometimes very slowly we learn how to get that under control. Whatever the circumstances we learn that we must be attentive to the issues that leave us open to those temptations and we must also learn to fight those issues from the outset. And if we do that well, then sin will no longer control us.



A NOTE FROM YOUR DIRECTOR OF FAITH FORMATION AND YOUTH MINISTRY:

Dear Church Family,

Last week we began a new catechetical year. Faith Formation classes for grades K – 5 meet at both St. Mary's and St. Matthew. I'd like to give a big **THANK YOU to Jan Boyea**, who heads up the classes and Children's Liturgy at St. Mary's. Without her, there would be no classes there as I have classes here at St. Matthew. Jan is a faith-filled woman of God that loves children. That great combination is the perfect criteria for serving as a catechist. If this is something you think you may be interested in or would just like to discuss, please reach out to me and we'll talk. My contact information is on Page 2 of the Bulletin. And if you're unable to help in any other way – please pray for our young people. Prayer is powerful and needed. Thank you.

This weekends readings for the **26th Sunday of Ordinary Time** challenge us, as Catholics, to understand that we are not exclusive in God's eyes. God welcomes all, as we should. This is expressed in the first reading, from the Book of Numbers, as *"Eldad and Medad are*"

prophesying in the camp, Joshua, son of Nun, who from his youth had been Moses' aide, said, 'Moses, my lord, stop them.' But Moses answered him, 'Are you jealous for my sake? Would that all the people of the LORD were prophets! Would that the LORD might bestow his spirit on them all!'"

Likewise, our second reading from St. James, laments on the needs and unjust treatment of laborers. "Behold, the wages you withheld from the workers who harvested your fields are crying aloud; and the cries of the harvesters have reached the ears of the Lord of hosts." James tells us that the rich got their wealth at the expense of the poor. This is still the case, as in today's world there is still a huge discrepancy between the wealthy and the poor. For instance, what we consider to be a "living wage" in this country is anything but. One of the core themes of Catholic Social Justice Teaching is the Option for the Poor and Vulnerable. The USCCB states that this is, "a basic moral test is how our most vulnerable members are faring. In a society marred by deepening divisions between rich and poor, our tradition recalls the story of the Last Judgment (Mt 25:31-46) and instructs us to put the needs of the poor and vulnerable first."

In this week's gospel reading from St. Mark, the disciples come to Jesus telling him they tried to stop someone casting out demons in Jesus' name because *he was not one of them*. Jesus responded, *"do not prevent him… There is no one who performs a mighty deed in my name who can at the same time speak ill of me. For whoever is not against us is for us."* Jesus points out the boundaries that are so often imposed on the poor and the vulnerable. As Christians, we must follow the lead of Jesus and be welcoming to all. We are meant to share our faith together, no matter our circumstances. After all, if Jesus hadn't invited a tax collector to follow him, there would have been no St. Matthew to name our church for!

NEW YORK ALREADY HAS TOO MUCH ABORTION.

New York currently has one of the most extreme abortion laws in the world, permitting abortions up to birth, allowing non-physicians to perform abortions, and excluding parents from the decisionmaking process. By making "reproductive healthcare" a constitutional right, it would be impossible to pass even the most limited restrictions to protect women and children, and would further threaten the conscience rights of health professionals and institutions that refuse to take unborn life by abortion.



CHILDREN SHOULDN'T MAKE LIFE-ALTERING MEDICAL DECISIONS WITHOUT PARENTAL CONSENT.

Confusion about gender has become an epidemic among young people. But gender reassignment therapies and surgeries have serious life-long consequences, and their safety and benefit are increasingly questioned, even by secular researchers. "Gender-affirming care" is based in ideologies that do not recognize the true nature of human sexuality and often these 'treatments' fail to adequately address underlying mental health struggles. This amendment would permit troubled children to seek these dangerous procedures without parental consent or even knowledge, excluding from the conversation those who know them best and desire their true good.

3 AGE RESTRICTIONS MAKE A LOT OF SENSE.

Laws "discriminate" based on age all the time. For the protection of vulnerable youth, we set minimum ages to drive, smoke, drink, or consent to sexual activity. To prevent elder abuse, we provide special privileges and protections to those over 65. This so-called new constitutional "protection" would make it much easier for activists to overturn these common-sense safeguards. Age restrictions that relate to "sexual freedom" or "the right to die" are those that would be most likely to be challenged. Some countries already permit children as young as 12 to consent to assisted suicide or euthanasia, which could soon be legalized in New York. We want to ensure that appropriate protections remain in place for vulnerable age groups.
